Wall of Heroes" (אר הבורת) - Kir Ha'Gwara) is a project by the Department of Zionist Activities for the Diaspora of the World Zionist Organization that remembers and honors those who have fallen since October 7th. Many relatives and friends of these fallen have chosen to memorialize their loved ones through bumper stickers. These bumper stickers share a picture of the fallen as well as a quote, either their own or one that represents them. Through this we remember them, honor them, karn about them, and learn their teachings for our lives. These stickers have been placed all over Israel and can be seen in plazas, street signs, train stations cars, and personal belongings. The stickers have also been distributed in many communities in the diasport to share and honor the leagy of our heres.

Each day has a dedicated individual to read and learn about. Some of the individuals have a sticker with a quote that they either wrote or they family chose to describe them. This past year has been difficult for Jews worldwide. We have had friends and family killed, injured, displaced, and the ripple effect is that our lives have been changed forever.

However, this past year has shown us that we are a nation of heroes. Each and every one of us has the potential to be a superhero, make a difference and make the world a better place with our actions and our legacy.

We have had so many heroes who we have lost this past year, so many people to be inspired from, so many people to learn from about their values and their legacy.

These heroes are connected to a long chain of heroes, that we especially think about during Hanukkah. The Maccabees were individuals who fought for the Jewish people and traditions against the Greek- few against the many, weak against the strong – and they won! And we are winning!

From the Maccabees we have a lineage of heroes connecting us to the pioneers of Zionism, individuals who came to Israel, built it from nothing, and fought for it with all their soul and might. Our heroes of today are now part of this incredible lineage, connecting us from Hanukkah until today. This year, we have the opportunity to connect to the Maccabees of our day and age. These are our heroes who fought for our Jewish country in the Land of Israel, exactly like the Maccabees of Hanukkah.

## Day 1 Ben Zussman Sergeant First Class (Res.)

"I have set watchmen over Jerusalem and one day I will be one of them"

Ben was born and lived in Jerusalem. He was a fan of ping-pong, soccer, and completely committed to serving the State of Israel. He served in the Engineering corps during the war and was killed in Gaza on December 3rd, 2023. He became a symbol and an example for many people worldwide because of the letter he wrote to his family a few days before his death. In this letter, he tells his family to make his mourning a celebration, a gathering of family and friends that he would love to be a part of. He also wrote: "I am happy and thankful for the privilege that I had of protecting our beautiful country and the people of Israel." He fell at age 22, survived by his parents and two younger siblings.

## Value: Sense of duty "Whoever is faithful to Hashem, join me!"

The quote above, in Hebrew מי לה' אליי is often associated with the Maccabee Mattitya. His sense of duty to protect the values and land of the Jewish people is a strong theme of Hanukkah. This value is presented also through Ben Zussman and of course through our Zionist pioneers who took initiative to fight for our independence after 2000 years we were not able to do so.

During the foundation of the State, various Hanukkah tunes were written that since then have become popular. These tunes emphasize the sense of duty, the initiative, the bravery, that connects us from the Maccabees until today.

**Roei Dawy** Sergeant First Class

"This is the land of Israel for which I do what I do"

Roei was born and raised in Jerusalem. He loved the sports team Hapoel Jerusalem, music and dreamt of becoming a journalist, as well as hoping for the moment to propose to his girlfriend. He had a deep love for Israel. He served in the Givati brigade and wrote in a letter to his family a few days before he was killed: "if I knew I would be killed, I would have done it again," because of the deep pride of dying for the sake of the Jewish people and the State of Israel. He is survived by his parents, a sister and a brother.

### Value: Love of the land - Ahavat Ha'aretz

For most of our history, our nation were an agricultural people. Our love of the land came from us working the land with our own hands, connecting to it. Our Zionist pioneers did the same. They connected to the land not only through agriculture but also building homes, permanent, making this not only our land but our State.

This shows that often the love of our land can be expressed through food. During Hanukkah we have food with oil that represents the miracle we experienced, and the dough from the wheat and flour connects us to the land.

In this relation, we are sharing Roei's favorite recipe that his sister would make for him every time he came home from the army: Tiramisu. So while you are eating foods with oil, we suggest to dedicate an evening to make this with your family and think of Roei, of his favorite food, and his love for the Land.



## **Tiramisu recipe:**

#### Ingredients

2 packets or 500 grams of tea biscuits Espresso or 5-6 teaspoons instant coffee with hot water

For serving: Cocoa powder

For the cream: 500 ml of whipping cream 250 grams of mascarpone cheese - 40% 80 grams instant vanilla pudding 1/3 cup of sugar



#### Directions

Start preparing the cream - whip cream and sugar for 1-2 minutes, add the mascarpone cheese and the instant pudding until the cream is set.

Dip the biscuits in coffee and place in a pan.

Pour a layer of cream over the layer of biscuits.

Repeat this twice

Place in the refrigerator to set for at least two hours (preferably overnight).

Before serving, sprinkle cocoa powder on top





## Day 3 Rose Lubin Staff Sergeant

"I will do something great for the world, I won't wait for the world to do something great for me."

Rose was born in Atlanta Georgia, where she was raised as an active part of the Jewish community. She was the oldest to her four siblings, three brothers and one sister. She was a Champion wrestler, a Varsity cheerleader, vegan, poet, artist, singer, dancer, volunteer, lover of horses and thrifter with bubbly energy that filled the room. She would dye her hair different colors representing who she was and how she felt. From a young age she knew she would move to Israel. At 18, Rose fulfilled her dream of joining the Israeli Defense Forces, She made Aliyah on her and drafted into Magav. On October 7, 2023, she helped defend Kibbutz Sa'ad where she lived, from Hamas terrorists preventing them from infiltrating. On November 6, 2023, Rose lost her life when guarding near the Damascus Gate, at 21 years old. We chose the 3rd night of Hanukkah to share about Rose as this is her Hebrew birthday.

## Value: Responsibility

It is an admirable value to take collective responsibility, to actually stand up and know that you need to be a part of something bigger, contribute, and make the world a better place. Rose is not only an example of an incredible Zionist who moved on her own to Israel, but also with incredible sense of responsibility to see the duty she had to become an IDF soldier herself.



### **Discussion point**

We invite you to have a conversation around your Hanukkah candles or your table.

- What responsibility do you have to the world?
- To your community and to the Jewish people?
- What is the great thing you are going to do for the world?

During Hanukkah it is a common custom to give gelt, a small amount of money to children. We suggest that in addition to Hanukkah gelt, that the first step of responsibility during this holiday can be giving Tzedakah to a place that you find important, that is making a difference in this world.







Day 4 Roi Nahary Captain "With Strength and Humility"

Raised in Moshav Ora right outside Jerusalem, Roi was one of twin boys, who both served in the Paratroopers brigade. He loved basketball and cared more about the other players and how they were feeling and performing than how he was playing himself. He cared for others deeply and also had a deep love for Jerusalem and Israel. On the 7th of October he rushed to protect Kfar Aza on the border, taking with him a few of his soldiers along the way. He died from his injuries two days later and his family followed his wishes of organ donation and with his death, he saved five lives.

## **Value: Humility**

When we are humble, taking action, while being thoughtful every step of the way, we can often see further success. We also give space for miracles, for recognition of the greatness around us, of the people, and the time and space that has helped us reach our goals. While we need strength, to have the power to take the next step, humility grounds us, allowing us to see the full picture and succeed.

In a way, this is how we can see the miracles around us, the Nissim. We recognize with humility the greatness and the assistance we have received from people around us, and from Hashem. We see this in the events of Hanukkah and also during this past year through these incredible heroes.

Amit was a resident of the Kibbutz Be'eri. She was inspired to become a paramedic following the passing of her father when she was 12. Seeing the medical treatment and assistance inspired her to be able to one day provide the same. For two years she worked as a paramedic on the Kibbutz before October 7th. On October 7th itself, she insisted remaining on the kibbutz and immediately ran to the infirmary to assist those who were injured. For seven hours straight she took care of the injured, saving many of their lives. These individuals all shared that Amit constantly encouraged them, lifted their spirits that they soon would be saved. Amit unfortunately did not have the same fate as the patients she saved, but her bravery will be remembered forever. She fell at age 22.

#### **Value: Bravery - גבורה**

Bravery can be expressed through a wide variety of ways. Through this booklet you are meeting eight heroes who were soldiers, except for Amit, who worked as a part of Magen David Adom, the national emergency organization that saves people's lives on a daily basis. These people are heroes as well. Many of them volunteer, learn and train to save people's lives and bring light into the world.

On Hanukkah we are not supposed to use our candles, we are only supposed to look at them. This is why we have the shamash. We are supposed to use this candle to light up and spread the light. We invite you to take inspiration from the shamash. Be the light to spread it further and make the world shine brighter than it did before.



Bring light into the world: Discuss ways with your family how you can volunteer, be a shamash and bring kindness and good into the world. Make your Hanukkah special and powerful by volunteering and dedicating this candle to taking action and doing something good for your community and for the Jewish people.



Day 6 Guy Simhi Staff Sergeant

Guy was born and raised in Kibbutz Re'im. The youngest of three siblings, he loved to surf, snowboard, play volleyball, play guitar, bike ride, and constantly surround himself with people to put a smile on their faces. He served in the Paratroopers unit and on the 7th of October was at the Nova party, during a short vacation home from the army. He was with a group of 14 friends and once the attacks began, he led his friends to safety in Kibbutz Re'im. His friends shared that when terrorists broke in with weapons in their hands, Guy jumped on the first one and fought him with his bare hands. He saved his friends and unfortunately was killed during the attack. He was 20 years old.

## Value: The Common Good

This past year we have seen Am Yisrael come together like never before. We all know someone who either is in Israel and has been impacted personally by the war during this past year, besides it has of course impacted us and our communities worldwide. We have seen immense unity and a strong sense of collective responsibility. The three words that we constantly say are "Am Yisrael Chai". Guy represents someone who took the first step, who led the way for the common good. We all have been inspired by people like Guy to take that first step and bring life to the words "Am Yisrael Chai," the people of Israel live.

Yakir was raised in the religious community of Moreshet located in the Galilee. One of 10 siblings, he was constantly happy, a huge soccer fan, very humble, with a lot of faith in Hashem. He is the second out of 10 children and was inspired by his older brother to serve in combat. Yakir ended up in Golani and became a commander. He always saw the positive and encourage others to do so too. On the 7th of October, Yakir was at a military post near Nahal Oz when he and his friends were attacked by terrorists. Yakir fought bravely, bringing injured soldiers to the dining hall as he left time and time again to fight, protect and save until he fell. He was 21.5 years old.

## Value: Happiness

During such a difficult time and year, it has been hard for many of us to be happy. And yet, many of the people who themselves lost their lives have requested in their last letters that their friends and family remaining behind will be happy, that we should remember to smile and be positive. We are honoring their wishes by not losing our spirit, by not losing the hope of victory in their names and honor. On Hanukkah, we celebrate our victory. Our nation experienced difficult times before and we lost people at battle, but the end result is that we won our sovereignty, we defeated the dark and evil to bring light and happiness into the world and for our people. This is expressed in the song we sing every night as a part of Hanukkah candle lighting Maoz Tzur.

We invite you to sing the full song together and think about Yakir, who was so connected to his Judaism, faith, and Hashem.

"Am Yisrael needs us!"

Liron was born in the town of Ofra. He was known as a very humble and modest person who made efforts to do acts of kindness, chesed. One of a twin and one out of three children, he was always looking out for everyone else around him. He refused to participate in activities in his yeshiva that left people out. As a commander, he would not go to sleep until he made sure that everything was ok with all his soldiers. He had a deep love for the Jewish people and Israel, he loved to hike and travel, and he felt a calling and sense of responsibility to serve, which he continued doing as the war began and his platoon entered Gaza. On the 21st of November, he was with his team in a Namer (a military armored vehicle) when he was hit. The last thing he asked his team was, "Did anyone else get hurt? I'm injured too." He was 25 years old.

Liron represents an individual who took care of everyone around him, while also understanding what his own role is in order to reach victory. Also Hanukkah is a holiday filled with individuals who took charge and understood their role in order to achieve victory for Israel and the Jewish people.
